VVA # 278 ACTIVITIES

Since our last newsletter VVA # 278 we held our 2nd Annual "Wagons for Veterans" which was a success thanks to all of our members and other volunteers' work. We set up an informational table at the Texas Work Force's Job Expo. The VVA Texas State Council meeting April 26 & 27 here in Texarkana, was in my opinion, a success! We were presented with a plaque from the Region VII Director Allan Manual proclaiming VVA # 278

as Region VII Chapter of the Year – 2019; \$1800 was raised for the Hero's Pantry, along with a buggy load of foodstuffs; and Fay J Durant raised \$1000 with his wine raffle which he donated to the Texas State Council's Scholarship fund! And our 23rd Annual "Veterans Information Fair" held May 18 we had 13 agencies or organizations and had over 50 veterans register. On May 27 we hosted our 36th annual Memorial Day Service and had a great crowd.

VA leaders are committed to actively engage in community-based efforts that maximize the collective impact of local services, stakeholders, and federal/state/municipal agencies working collectively to improve Veteran outcomes where they live, work, and raise their families.

3rd ANNUAL "WAGONS FOR VETERANS"

Saturday, April 18, 2020 at the Four States Fairgrounds we will host our 3rd annual "Wagons for Veterans" event. Again we will be looking for sponsors and donations to this event. Our books are open to any & everyone who would like to see them! We cleared a little over \$23,000 & are now looking for disabled & needy veterans to assist. This is also open to spouses of deceased veterans & immediate family members of veterans. Let us know if you know of a veteran who would apply for this assistance!

PRISONERS OF WAR/MISSING IN ACTION (POW/MIA)

AMERICANS ACCOUNTED FOR: The number still missing (POW/MIA) and otherwise unaccounted-for (KIA/BNR) from the Vietnam War is now 1,589. Of that number, 90% were lost in Vietnam or in areas of Cambodia or Laos under Vietnam's wartime control: Vietnam-1,246 (VN-452, VS-794); Laos-288; Cambodia-48; PRC territorial waters-7. The total accounted for since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975 is 994. A breakdown by country of these 994 Americans is: Vietnam – 671, Laos – 277, Cambodia – 42, & the PRC – 3. In addition, 63 US personnel were accounted for between 1973 & 1975, the formal end of the Vietnam War, for a grand total of 1,057. These country-specific numbers can & do fluctuate when investigations result in changes to loss locations. Of these 1590, 15 are from AR; 24 are from LA; 30 are from OK; and 101 are from TX. US Army -512; US Navy -353; US Marine Corps – 202; US Air Force – 494; Civilians – 28. There are still 126 Americans unaccounted for from the Cold War 2 from AR; 1 from LA; 3 from OK; & 4 from TX. As of May 29, 2019 there are still 7,660 Americans unaccounted for from the Korean War: 100 from AR; 142 from LA; 143 from OK; 425 from TX; 5830 from the Army; 908 from the Air Force; 276 from the Navy; & 645 from the USMC. As of May 29, 2019, there are still 72,716 Americans unaccounted for from World War II, 849 from AR; 978 from LA; 1220 from OK; & 3632 from TX; 16,727 from the Army; 20,087 from the Army Air Corps; 31,129 from the Navy; 2855 from the USMC. There are 6 Americans unaccounted for from Iraq Theater and other conflicts in the Middle East.

32nd ANNUAL POW/MIA VIGIL

On Friday & Saturday, September 20 & 21, 2019 VVA # 278 will host our 32nd Annual POW/MIA Vigil at the Korea/Vietnam Memorial at 7th Street & State Line Avenue in downtown Texarkana. At the time of this writing we will spend 27 hours and 12 minutes (1632 minutes), one minute for each American unaccounted for from

Vietnam (1589), one minute for each American who is unaccounted for from the Korean War and whose name is engraved on this Memorial (37), and one minute for each American unaccounted for from the Middle East (6). This time may change if there are any returns & identifications made of these 1632 Americans and we pray there are! Accordingly our tentative time for opening ceremonies will be 5:18 pm Friday and we will finish 27 hours and 12 minutes later, at 8:30 pm Saturday night. When we first started these Vigils there were 2555 Americans unaccounted for from the Vietnam War and we had 38 names of Korean War veterans on this Memorial who were still unaccounted for! So progress has been made but at a painfully slow pace. We would like to think that efforts like these Vigils and other events around the country has had some effect on the fact that 966 American remains have been returned to their family and friends, and for this we thank everyone who has participated over the years. THANK YOU!!!

TRIP TO WASHINGTON DC TO THE WALL

We are working on a trip to Washington, DC to see the Wall (Vietnam Veterans Memorial), the Korean War Memorial, World War II Memorial and Arlington National Cemetery and maybe a few other sites. We are looking at the week of October 21 – 26, 2019. If you are interested let us know! We are looking at Amtrac and have a fantastic travel agent from Hideaway, TX working on this for us! With getting on Amtrak in Texarkana there is no "direct" route for us to go. The best time and route that we can get is 17 hours to Chicago....17 hours to DC and then same back. Therefore leaving on one day we wouldn't be getting to DC until late on the next day and then almost 2 days getting home. What we are looking at is \$213/pp though for the roundtrip. We also might look at renting a van depending on how many we have sign up.

The VA MISSION Act puts Veterans and their needs at the center of their care. Through the MISSION Act, VA will:

- Provide you with more options for health care
- Offer an improved community care process
- Provide a new urgent care option
- Help you get access to the care you need at the right place at the right time
- Offer you great service through a nationwide network of high-quality care
- Provide more Veteran-to-Veteran peer specialists
- Expand the program to support Veteran caregivers

Through the MISSION Act, VA now has additional opportunities to enhance our high-quality health care to our nation's Veterans. SHREVEPORT, LA—— The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) will launch its new and improved community care program June 6, 2019, implementing portions of the VA Maintaining Internal Systems and Strengthening Integrated Outside Networks Act of 2018 (the MISSION Act), which both ends the Veterans Choice Program and establishes a new Veterans Community Care Program. The MISSION Act will strengthen the nationwide VA Health Care System by empowering Veterans to have more options in their health care decisions. Under the new & improved Veterans Community Care Program, Veterans can now work with their VA health care provider or other VA staff to see if they are eligible to receive community care. Eligibility for community care does not require a Veteran to receive that care in the community; Veterans can still choose to have VA provide their care. Veterans are eligible to choose to receive care in the community if they meet any of the following six eligibility criteria:

- 1. A Veteran needs a service not available at any VA medical facility.
- 2. A Veteran lives in a U.S. state or territory without a full-service VA medical facility. Specifically, this would apply to Veterans living in Alaska, Hawaii, New Hampshire and the U.S. territories of Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

- 3. A Veteran qualifies under the "grandfather" provision related to distance eligibility for the Veterans Choice Program.
- 4. VA cannot furnish care in a manner that complies within certain designated access standards. The specific access standards are described below. (Important: Access standards will continuously be evaluated.)
- Average drive time to a specific VA medical facility
- °30-minute average drive time for primary care, mental health and noninstitutional extended care services.
- °60-minute average drive time for specialty care. Note: Average drive times are calculated by VA using geo-mapping software.
- Appointment wait time at a specific VA medical facility
- •Twenty days for primary care, mental health care and noninstitutional extended care services, unless the Veteran agrees to a later date in consultation with his or her VA health care provider.
- •Twenty-eight days for specialty care from the date of request, unless the Veteran agrees to a later date in consultation with his or her VA health care provider.
- 5. The Veteran and the referring clinician agree it is in the best medical interest of the Veteran to receive community care based on defined factors.
- 6. VA has determined that a VA medical service line is not providing care in a manner that complies with VA's standards for quality.

The VA MISSION Act:

- Strengthens VA's ability to recruit and retain clinicians.
- Statutorily authorizes "Anywhere to Anywhere" telehealth provision across state lines.
- Empowers Veterans with increased access to community care.
- Establishes a new, urgent-care benefit that eligible Veterans can access in the community. The Shreveport VA serves approximately 38,000 Veterans every year, from parts of Louisiana, Arkansas, & Texas.
